




## **BAHRAIN CRAFTS** by Assouline

Capturing social and cultural shifts through art, photographs, installations, and experimental animations, the *resulting dialogue* is all set to stir up a *sensational* awakening, or rather, a *much-needed* re-awakening.




he 27th edition of Art Paris is set to return in April this year, celebrating modern and contemporary art, and attracting over 170 exhibitors from 25 countries. As one of the most highly anticipated art fairs in Europe, this edition brings with it a befitting spotlight on the conversations emerging from the Arab world. "In 2018, it was one of the first art fairs in Europe to

host a platform dedicated to the Saudi art scene, in collaboration with the Misk Foundation," recalls Guillaume Piens, Director of Art Paris. "This year, we look forward to welcoming Lebanese participants such as Tanit and Saleh Barakat, as well as the Kuwait-based gallery Hunna Art, which exclusively showcases female talent from the region,"

he says. The program includes two main themes: Immortal: A Focus on Figurative Painting in France, curated by Amélie Adamo and Numa Hambursin, and Out of Bounds, curated by Simon Lamunière, featuring works that shed light on the intersection of culture, heritage, personal memory, and collective history.

Shown for the first time outside of Saudi Arabia, is the stunning installation 'Neuma: The Forgotten Ceremony' by Saudi-American artist Sarah Brahim and French artist, Ugo Left: Galerie Tanit, Humming birds over my city 2022, Zena Assi

Schiavi. First unveiled in AlUla as part of the Villa Hegra prefiguration program it pays homage to the rituals of the pre-Islamic tribes, and is inspired by the AlUla's mythology, heritage, and archaeology. Another prominent feature is 'Out of Bounds' which presents a curated selection of 18 international artists, including female Arab artists that are daring to push the limits of understanding, offering new perspective on identity, power, and belonging. "Many artists will also be represented by European galleries, including Saudi artist Mohammad AlFarraj by Mennour, Lebanese artist Zena Assi by Tanit, and Iraqi-origin artist Sama

Alshaibi by Esther Woerdehoff Gallery, whose work challenges stereotypes of Arab women," adds Piens. Bringing forward the importance of multi-ethnicity, cross-cultural influences, and cultural hybridization, this year's fair is an invitation for deeper reflection on cultural acceptance, and awareness.

With 'Out of Bounds' Simon Lamunière curates based on themes of origins, gender, history and geography. From Kuwait, artists Raya Kassisieh, Razan AlSarraf, and Nour Elbasuni explore social and cultural differences, while from Beirut, Zena Assi highlights shared human experiences. "Through painting, sculpture, animation, and installation, my work delves into themes of migration, war, gender, identity, and social change. By documenting and reflecting on cultural and social shifts in the Arab world - particularly in Beirut - while drawing from my own journey, I seek to foster cross-cultural understanding and appreciation between East and West, discussions among diverse audiences, and bridging cultural divides," she says.

Meanwhile, Iraqi-artist Sama Alshaibi uses photographs to drive her rather bold message forward. "I'm interested in the societal impact of unequal power relations between the West and the Middle East, and how that domination is articulated through photographs," she says. This collective representation of female Arab artists from the Middle East is sure to leave a lasting impact that begs for a reawakening of sensitivities which serve to foster peace, unity, and restoration
